Sun, Sun, Sun, we all understand how important the sun is for growing plants especially flowering orchids and this seemed to be the theme both of our most recent speakers focused on. In order to get your plants to bloom give them the most sun they can tolerate without over exposing them. Easier said than done sometimes.

Ideally I like to add new plants to my shade house very early in the year when the sun is furthest away from us. This gives the orchid the chance to acclimate to the sun's exposure as it rises slowly and higher in the sky, always watching to see how the plants adapt. I try to do this with the more expensive plants I purchase. I have the bug though and like most of us, am adding to the collection throughout the rest of the year as well.

I've been asked about a Cigar orchid and its care recently and was unable to answer any questions about them, but it peaked my curiosity. I learned that it's very rare and only survives in the southern most point of the Florida peninsula as well as Central America. If you have experience with this protected plant I would like to learn more.

Hurricane Orchid Prep

We live in South Florida and hurricanes are part of our lives whether we like it or not. What do we do with our orchid collection when a hurricane threatens South Florida, do we bring some inside our garage or house? Do we put them on the patio or on the ground? Many of us have an extensive collection of orchids, and as we get older the more challenging the task of a hurricane is.

Sandi Block-Brezner and Gloria Messler of the Flamingo Orchid Society have a good solution. They wrap there orchid benches in orange construction netting from Home Depot or Lowes. If you measure each section of your growing areas, cut it to fit, and color coded the shade house and pergola poles with a spot of colored paint to match the orange sections with the same colored spot, you can also write on the netting. You will need to tie down the netting using 6" ball - bungee cords (Amazon) to affix the netting (you can use other bungees or even zip ties). You can do this ahead of time and store it in the garage, so when needed you are ready to support your orchids. Most people will bring their prize or favorite orchids inside or a covered patio area. Bright burning sun is typical in the wake of a hurricane and shade will be invaluable. Remember, wind velocity increases as height increases. If you don't use the advice above, get your orchids as close to the ground as possible but off the ground as flooding may saturate them with fungus and bacteria. Usually it is not wise to attempt to cover them with a tarp or shade cloth that is not tied down securely, as the whipping of the cloth by the wind likely will cause more harm than the wind itself.

Dr. Motes advice: When a hurricane is looming, you should run all the orchids as dry as possible to reduce the threat of fungus and bacteria. But just before the storm strikes you should saturate the orchids to the max. First because we want the orchids to be as heavy as possible to help prevent them from being blown away. Second, because you never know if water source is still good; electricity for the pump may be off for days or even weeks. Thoroughly watered plants will be much happier should this occur. Even if you are able to bring some or all of your collection inside, water them thoroughly with two to three applications spaced a few minutes apart. They will be perfectly happy for a day or two without water, and you will have enough mess to deal with without watering orchids in the house.

We hope that there will not be any hurricanes this year, but if there is you will be ready. Good Luck!

For Your Information

The City of Plantation has stated that they will be temporarily switching to free chlorination in its drinking water system beginning at 8 a.m. on Monday, September 12, 2022 and ending at 8 a.m. on Monday, September 26, 2022. It is a regularly scheduled preventive maintenance for water systems using combined chlorination (chloramines) for disinfection. Some might notice a slight change in the taste or smell of their tap water. The water will remain safe. If you are concerned for using it on your orchids here is a simple approach from Andy Collins, an experienced grower. "Chlorine is a poison and can burn your plants if too strong. Hope for rain, water as little as possible when heavy smell. If it's mild to little smell then it's ok to water. Just check the smell." Some people like to collect rain water for watering when this occurs. **Happy Growing** !


