### Fun Brchid Facts and Jrivia Questions

he bond between orchids and certain species of insects is tight and highly specialized. Petals have similar shape and color like female insects to attract males and ensure pollination. Ophrys apifera, better known as the Bee Orchid, lures bees with its enticing smell and bee like appearance. When a male bee approaches the flower to mate, it becomes covered in pollen and is sent off to pollinate the next orchid it visits. [from Flowerweb]



Charles Darwin is renowned for his theory of evolution. He also determined that orchids must be pollinated by whatever was available in the native fauna. Thus he predicted a moth in Madagascar must exist that was capable of reaching 10 to 11 inches inside a particular orchid to reach the nectar and perform pollination. Was such a moth ever discovered? Orchids are hypoallergenic! Do you have allergies? Well, you have found your flower in orchids because they are great for people with allergies! Orchid pollen is not airborne, rather, it is stored in a waxy substance, called a pollen packet. This packet will stick to the pollinator that will then deliver the packet to another orchid. - Dry plants hard once or twice.
- Apply liquid fertilizer instead of water during dry patches.
- Watch for thrips when rain has been sparse for several days.
- Finish top cutting and planting of vandaceous genera.
